Biblical Reasons for Joining a Church:

- You prove that you’re not ashamed to identify with Christ or His people.
- You stop being an independent Christian.
- You have a greater opportunity to use your spiritual gift.
- You openly demonstrate the reality of the body of Christ.
- You participate in a more balanced ministry.
- You demonstrate your commitment to “the proper working of each individual part.”
- You encourage new believers to commitment to the local body of Christ.
- You encourage a ministry when you find it faithful and join it.
